<b>Steve Haskins/USA</b> (November 13, 1958)	0	0	0	2	0	Earned a full exemption on the 2010 Champions Tour after finishing T2 at the National Qualifying Tournament...Won a pair of events on the Nationwide Tour and ranks second in career starts (370) on that circuit.
<b>Peter Senior/AUS</b> (July 31, 1959)	0	26	0	26	1994, 1996 International Presidents Cup team	1989 Australian Open and Australian PGA Championship...1991 and 1995 Australian Masters...Led the Australian Tour’s Order of Merit in 1987, 1989 and 1993.
<b>Jim Roy/USA</b> (August 4, 1959)	0	0	0	15	0	One of central New York’s all-time winningest golfers and the area’s top amateur for the last 12 years...Has claimed five New York State Golf Association titles.
<b>Trevor Dodds/NAM</b> (September 26, 1959)	1	6	0	10	0	Led the Canadian Tour’s Order of Merit in both 1995 and 1996...Lone TOUR victory came at the 1998 Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic. Also won three times on the Nationwide Tour.

<b>Tommy Armour III/USA</b> (October 8, 1959)	2	1	0	8	0	Set PGA TOUR's 72-hole numerical scoring record when he shot 26-under 254 to win the 2003 Valero Texas Open...Won both of his Nationwide Tour titles in consecutive weeks in 1994...Grandson of World Golf Hall of Famer Tommy Armour.
<b>Corey Pavin/USA</b> (November 16, 1959)	15	12	1995 U.S. Open	27	1991, 1993, 1995 U.S. Ryder Cup team and Captain of the 2010 U.S. Ryder Cup squad; 1994, 1996 United States Presidents Cup team.	Was the PGA TOUR's leading money-winner in 1991...Biggest of 15 TOUR wins was U.S. Open victory in 1995 at Shinnecock Hills...1982 College Player of the Year while at UCLA.
<b>Paul Azinger/USA</b> (January 6, 1960)	12	2	1992 PGA Championship	14	1989, 1991, 1993, 2002, 2008 United States Ryder Cup team and Captain of the U.S. Ryder Cup team in 2008; 2000 United States Presidents Cup team.	Was the PGA and Golf World Player of the Year in 1987 after winning three times...Also won three events in 1993, including his only major title at the PGA Championship...Winner of THE TOUR Championship in 1992...PGA TOUR's Comeback Player of the Year in 2000.
<b>David Peoples/USA</b> (January 9, 1960)	2	1	0	3	0	Winner of the 1991 Buick Southern Open and 1992 Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic.
<b>Bobby Clampett/USA</b> (April 22, 1960)	1	0	0	1	0	Lone PGA TOUR win came at the 1982 Southern Open...Winner of the 1978 and 1980 California State Amateur...Member of 1982 U.S. World Cup team.
<b>Jodie Mudd/USA</b> (April 23, 1960)	4	0	1990 PLAYERS Championship	11	0	Winner of four TOUR events including the 1990 PLAYERS

						Championship. Also claimed the season-ending Nabisco Championship in 1990...Represented the U.S. in the 1990 World Cup...Three-time All-American at Georgia Southern and played on the 1982 U.S. Walker Cup team...1981 U.S. Public Links champion.
<b>Bill Glasson/USA</b> (April 29, 1960)	7	0	0	8	0	Won seven times on the PGA TOUR including a pair of titles in 1988...PGA TOUR Comeback Player of the Year in 1997...Two-time All-American at Oral Roberts.
<b>Mark Carnevale/USA</b> (May 21, 1960)	1	0	0	2	0	Voted as the 1992 PGA TOUR Rookie of the year after claiming the Chattanooga Classic that season...Also won the 1997 Inland Empire Open on the Nationwide Tour...Winner of the 1990 Utah Open and 1984 Virginia Open.
<b>Mark Calcavecchia/USA</b> (June 12, 1960)	13	6	1989 British Open	22	1987, 1989, 1991 and 2002 United States Ryder Cup team; 1998 U.S. Presidents Cup team.	13-time winner on the PGA TOUR with biggest victory coming at the 1989 British Open (defeated Wayne Grady and Greg Norman in the first multiple-hole playoff system)...A three-time winner of the Phoenix Open who set seven TOUR scoring records when he captured the 2001 event...Runner-up at the 1988 Masters.
<b>J.L. Lewis/USA</b> (July 18, 1960)	2	1	0	3	0	Winner of the 1999 John Deere Classic and 2003 84 Lumber Classic of Pennsylvania...Three-time Player

						of the Year in the Southwest Texas PGA Section.
<b>Kenny Perry/USA</b> (August 10, 1960)	14	0	0	16	2004, 2008 United States Ryder Cup team; 1996, 2003, 2005 and 2009 U.S. Presidents Cup team.	Has won 14 times on the PGA TOUR with 11 titles coming after age 40...Winner of the Payne Stewart Award in 2009...Runner-up at the 2009 Masters.
<b>Tom Byrum/USA</b> (September 28, 1960)	1	0	0	1	0	Winner of the 1989 Kemper Open and lost two other TOUR events in playoffs.
<b>Steve Lowery/USA</b> (October 12, 1960)	3	0	0	4	0	Won three times on the PGA TOUR with most recent victory coming at the 2008 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am...Lone title on the Nationwide Tour came at the 1992 Tulsa Open...Was a two-time All-America choice at the University of Alabama in 1982, 1983.
<b>Ian Baker-Finch/AUS</b> (October 24, 1960)	2	14	1991 British Open	16	Captain's Assistant for the International Presidents Cup Team in 1996, 2003, 2005 and 2007.	A two-time winner on the PGA TOUR with biggest victory coming at the 1991 British Open at Royal Birkdale...Has been a TV announcer for CBS Sports golf telecasts since 2007 after working in the same role for ABC Sports/ESPN since 1998.
